Letter written from Sewell Wells to wife. Written from Appomattox in 1865:

Wells 1828-1893

PT Co B 189 Regt NY Inf
Enlisted for one year Sep 3 1864 Mustered out June 6 1865

United States Sanitary Commission.

Steffens Court House Va
Apr. 11th /65

Dear wife & home

I have been so busy that I have not had time to write for some time. I left a detachment of my Regt broke camp on the 10th of March and went towards Dinwiddie court house and there turned with me 2 or 4 miles and got into a severe fight in the afternoon in which Geo. W. Bascom, G. Campbell, Richard Lee, A. Coon, and my company was wounded and G. S. Brown was supposed to be killed. The next day the 189th took to support a battery in which many were killed. The next day we charged the Rebel works and lost some men. J. E. Alexander was recruited to the 189th. The doctor of my Co. has had to have his leg amputated.

100 to the road and I can see almost a mile and see the row all the way. This division is guarding the guns now there has been no mail here since the army arrived, but it has started out once. I sent a letter to you the 10th. I think this army will stay here until it is known whether Johnson will see order or not. If he does this army will probably be disbanded and sent home. I have seen war in most of all its forms since the 3rd of March have seen more and more than I ever expected to see and on the other hand have witnessed the surrender of the enemy, which I hope will end the rebellion. I saw a fugitive called this Brigade to Antietam on the 9th after the surrender of Lee and told us we had fought the last battle of the war, and requested us to sing. Grace had from heaven all blessing from afterwards prayer by Chaplain Rodgers. from your loving husband, hoping we will meet again.

Saturday we was on the skirmish line. That was the day that the south side road was taken. Sunday we started after Long streets forces. Followed them 2 days and then started after Lee. The 5th Corps was the flanking column, we had to march first on one side and then the other of the Rebel army, we had to march almost night and day until the 9th when we got in ahead of Lee's army. The rest of the army of the Potomac had got all around them and he was obliged to surrender. There is many incidents connected with the march after the Rebs, that I can tell better after I get home than to write at now. I expect to get home in June, as I wrote to you before. I have seen Gardner twice since we started from camp, we marched through the most beautiful

country I ever saw. After we left the vicinity of Petersburg the lonesome looking pine trees began to disappear and oak and hickory to fill their place, and the land is more rolling, and such sights of peach orchards & sugar trees were in full bloom. There was a large peach orchard on every plantation and in many places the road sides were lined with them for miles.

Apr 12. 1865 Steady S.W.

The first division 5th corps, was called out this morning and formed in two lines 8 rods apart. The Rebel prisoners commenced coming in by regiments and Brigades, divisions etc and stacking arms, they have got through and are scattering for their houses. I cannot tell how many there was. The guns are stacked so as to make about

LONGTIME BELFAST RESIDENT
1913-2005

FRIENDSHIP - George L. Fisk, 91, died Friday (March 18, 2005) at
Wellsville Manor Nursing Home following a lengthy illness.

Born March 30, 1913, in the town of Richburg, he was the son of Harry
and Viola Green Fisk. On September 4, 1937, in Friendship, he married
the former Irene Lucy Wells, who survives.

Mr. Fisk resided most of his life on White Creek Road in the town of Belfast.

He was a 1929 graduate of Cuba High School and for a short time he helped run the family dairy farm on White Creek Road. For several years he was employed at Daystrom Furniture in Friendship and for many years at Acme Electric Corp. in Cuba, retiring in 1978.

He and his wife moved to Friendship in 1981. He enjoyed gardening and traveling.

Mr. Fisk was a member of the Inavale Grange.

Surviving besides his wife are several nieces, nephews, and cousins.

He was predeceased by two brothers, Harold Fisk and Gerald Fisk, and by three sisters, Fern Ruediger, Laura Hasard and Aleta Hawkes.

Friends may call at the Treusdell Funeral Home, Friendship, Wednesday (March 23, 2005) from 12:30 to 2 p.m., at which time funeral and committal services will be held. The Rev. A Bridge to the Future

In 2005 Irene Fisk endowed a scholarship for non-traditional studies

George and Irene Fisk grew up in Allegany County and lived here all their lives, but came from quite different circumstances. He was one of six children. She was an only child of the Wells family, after which the town of Wellsville was named. She grew up on a farm; he was passed from one relative's house to another's for 12 years after his mother died.

He was determined to finish high school, though, and graduated from Cuba in 1930. Irene finished Friendship High School then went on to Alfred University, graduating in 1929 with a teaching degree. She put it to use immediately, teaching at one-room schoolhouses in the area. George went to work for the Erie Railroad, happy to find a job at the onset of the Great Depression.

The two met within a few years, marrying in 1937. It was a union that would last 68 years, until his death in 2005. Shaped by the difficult economic times, the Fisks practiced frugality and worked hard. They invested any extra money, an activity that became a lifelong hobby for George.

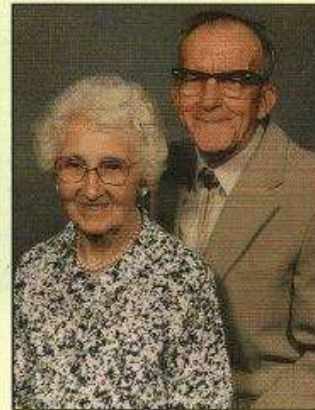
They started their married life on a farm of their own, but soon moved in with Irene's parents to care for them. George left the railroad to work at Daystrom Furniture in Friendship, and stayed until the plant closed. He got a job at Acme Electric in Cuba, and worked there until he retired.

Later in life, Irene went to work for the county's Department of Social Services, staying there until she retired. The Fisks didn't have any children of their own, but Irene often took in young people she met through her work who needed a hand.

In 1981 the Fisks sold the family farm and moved into Friendship, to be closer to the stores and the bank and the Catholic Church, where Irene was the organist

for many years. They would stay there for many years, accumulating significant assets as they continued to invest and save. They enjoyed retirement and good health, traveling extensively across the United States.

In 2005 George suffered a stroke and together they moved into Wellsville Manor, where he could receive more extensive care. He passed away a few months later.



Shortly thereafter, Irene decided to make a special gift to the Allegany County Area Foundation. Knowing the importance of education, she wanted to endow a scholarship. She also knew that many students in the area would rather learn a trade than follow a traditional academic course of study, though, so the scholarship would be for a student pursuing a technical area of study.

Another requirement was that the gift be anonymous until after her death. She passed away in 2009, shortly after her 102nd birthday, finally allowing the Foundation to acknowledge the couple's generosity by renaming the scholarship. It is now known as The George and Irene Fisk Memorial Fund.

WELLSVILLE - Happy 100th birthday to Irene Wells Fisk, who is not only a centenarian, but in Wellsville's sesquicentennial year, also the great-granddaughter of village and town namesake Gardner Wells.

At a recent town board meeting, town Supervisor Jim Cretekos passes a petition resolving "the Town Board of the Town of Wellsville dedicates October 17, 2007 as Irene Wells Fisk Day."

Today, Cretekos will present the petition to Fisk at a special birthday party at the Wellsville Manor nursing home where she resides.

Fisk is the daughter of Justin and Anna (Alderson) Wells and the great-granddaughter of Civil War Veteran Gardner Wells who was a member of the First New York Dragoons, and who was with General Ulysses S. Grant when General Robert E. Lee surrendered at Appomatox.

Wells settled here in the early 1800s and was the largest landowner when the town and the village fathers decided to name the town and village after him. Some time later he moved to the Friendship area.

Fisk, born October 17, 1907, graduated from Friendship High School in 1925 and from Alfred University in 1929, where she majored in history and science.

For several years she taught school in Friendship and New Hudson. She married George L. Fisk September 4, 1937. He died in 2005.

Fisk also worked at the Allegany County Social Services Department for about 10 years. Her hobbies are sewing, gardening, and traveling.

She will be recognized by Wellsville Supervisor James Cretekos at 2 p.m. when he will present her with the proclamation declaring October 17, Irene Wells Fisk Day in the Town of Wellsville.

FRIENDSHIP - Irene W. Fisk, 102, formerly of 11 E. Water St., died Tuesday (October 27, 2009) at Manor Hills Assisted Living Facility in Wellsville following a brief illness.

Born October 17, 1907, in the town of Belfast, she was the daughter of Justin G. and Anna Alderson Wells. On September 4, 1937, in Friendship, she married George L. Fisk, who died March 18, 2005.

Irene had lived most of her life on the White Creek Road in the town of Belfast. She was a graduate of Friendship High School, class of 1925, and graduated from Alfred University in 1929 with a Bachelor of Arts degree majoring in history and science.

She taught for several years in rural school districts in the town of New Hudson and Jackson Hill District #6 in Friendship. For many years, she was a caseworker for Allegany County in Belmont, retiring in 1974. She and her husband moved to Friendship in 1981.

Irene was a member of Sacred Heart Church in Friendship and its Altar and Rosary Society, the Travelers Club of Friendship and Inavale Grange.

She enjoyed sewing, needlecraft, gardening and traveling.

Surviving are several nieces, nephews, and cousins.
